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The future of adult social care

Cap on care costs

Over the next three years, the government plans to invest £5.4 billion in reforms to adult social care, building on the measures in the Health and Care Act, which includes £3.6 billion to reform the social care charging system.

DHSC has released updated operational guidance on implementing the cap on care costs, along with the government's response to the consultation on the draft guidance. The guidance is intended to support local authorities in preparing to implement the reforms from October 2023.

As a result of these changes, care costs will be capped at £86,000, and a more generous means test will be introduced, raising the upper capital limit from £23,350 to £100,000, and the lower capital limit from £14,250 to £20,000.

The Government's consultation received 161 responses, indicating broad support of the policy principles and the aims of the reforms. Feedback suggested that sections of the guidance needed further development for clarity and usability, and they have been working with local authorities and the adult social care sector to clarify and expand the guidance.

The guidance updates the existing care and support statutory guidance (CASS) and covers:

- Cap on care costs (including daily living costs; what counts towards the cap; the metering process; requesting that the local authority meets self-funders' needs and cross-border issues).
- Independent personal budgets (including the principles of establishing an independent personal budget; verification of the purchase of care; dispute resolution; and moving from an independent personal budget to a personal budget).
- Care accounts (including what should be included in a care account; care account statements; retention of care accounts; and portability of care accounts).

Fair Cost of Care (FCOC) and Market Sustainability

As previously advised, the closing date for the home care (FCOC) survey has been extended to close of business on Friday 22 July to give more time for providers to submit a response. We have been strongly encouraging submissions as obtaining information from as many providers as possible is key to determining the cost of care in Leicestershire and fees for 2023/24 and 2024/25.

Thank you to all providers who have submitted survey information – it is greatly valued and will ensure that this exercise is as accurate as possible.

The care home survey was carried out in February and since that time Care Analytics have been analysing the results and drafting the FCOC report for that sector. Care Analytics are also carrying out this work for most other Councils in the region, which will allow a wider understanding of the cost of care to be developed. The Council expects to receive the report during the summer.

Those documents will be presented to Leicestershire County Council's Cabinet in early autumn. Based on the contents of the reports, we will then work with providers to finalise a Market Sustainability Plan for Leicestershire.

Making Every Contact Count

Making Every Contact Count (MECC) is an approach to improving the health of the population that everyone can use, using the many conversations we have to encourage and help people to make healthier lifestyle choices. No change to personal protective equipment (PPE) or testing guidance

The guidance for PPE and COVID-19 testing in adult social care settings remains unchanged. The <u>COVID-19 supplement to the infection prevention and control</u> resource for adult social care should be consulted for PPE and testing requirements.

DHSC future data collection including new mandatory requirements

DHSC is working on a long-term approach to data collection from care providers that will replace the mandatory Capacity Tracker dataset from 31 July 2022, which is part of a longer-term approach being developed and co-produced with care providers and other stakeholders.

The aim is to engage closely with all stakeholders to identify and agree key data needs and look at the opportunities to streamline current data collections so that data can be captured once and shared with all that need it including providers, local authorities, CQC and national government.

DHSC held workshops in April and June to identify data needs, data concerns, data collected, and data provided to different organisations. If you were unable to attend one of these workshops or did attend and have further feedback, you can complete the <u>data survey for care providers</u>. The deadline to submit your views is Friday 22 July 2022.

The new guidance for adult social care providers to comply with information provisions under the Health and Care Act 2022 will come into effect from Sunday 31 July 2022.

Fax communication with the Customer Service Centre

Over the past year, Leicestershire County Council has been reviewing its contact channels into its Customer Service Centre. This is to ensure we are able to provide as efficient as service as possible to both members of the public and professionals alike.

The latest of these changes relates to the fax servers that some providers use to send through incident reports. We have taken the decision to close these fax servers down and they will be de-commissioned on the week commencing 25 July 2022.

Instead, providers will have two options for submitting an incident report:

- 1. The first, is via our online portal which will ask a series of questions about the incident and allow you to upload any associated documentation. <u>The link to</u> this form is available on our professional resources website.
- 2. The second, is via the telephone for incidents of a more serious and highrisk nature – on 0116 305 0004.
